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

It is as if the State forgot that we have created seaside areas with tourist and professional activities that are concentrated in France... a quarter of the total population! »

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He continued: "We must defend these homes and this economic activity against rising seas at all costs. But for the time being, nothing is being done," said Nicolas Youf, a representative of the Association for the Defence of the West Cotentin Coastline (ADTCOC) in Saint-Germain-sur-Ay, one of the municipalities that has been badly affected by the recent storms.

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
